Many people view it as the "dream" scenario - working entirely from home. This is far more possible in the modern age of the Internet than at any other time in history. Thanks to high-speed connections, people from all parts of the world are able to cooperate and work together in an amazing array of enterprises and all without leaving their office or their homes.

This report is going to examine the legit online jobs, and it will also look at the things necessary for those who really want to earn all of their income through a work at home job.

There are a lot of things to consider before you can actually begin working at home, however, and one of the most relevant is the difference between legit jobs and scams. For example, you must never pay to get any listings for actual online or work at home options. While there may be freelancing websites that require membership fees, this is entirely different from a website that asks you to purchase listings or pay to do work.

You must also consider if you are really "cut out" for this way of working. For instance, will you have the self-discipline necessary to avoid the couch, TV, and other distractions that reside all around your home? Many people who try to work from home quickly discover that they are not getting that much work completed during the day, and they soon realize it is because they are busy doing regular household tasks such as laundry and dishes, paying bills, and even tackling some chores instead of sitting at their desks and doing their work.

This is not the case for everyone who opts to work at home, but it must not be overlooked that there is always the potential to "slack off" a bit and this is often a hard habit to break.

There is also a great deal of isolation in the work from home scenario, and this is especially true for people who are single. Because of this many people get off to a good start with their work at home jobs, but soon begin to lose interest

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because there is nothing to their daily lives but the work, and very little outside stimulation. They might miss interacting with co-workers or even having someone to sit down and eat their lunch with, and this is usually something that makes them lose their interest in such a working environment.

Does this mean that such people can never work from home? Not at all, it just means that they will have to enter into this lifestyle at a slower pace than those who don't mind the isolation or who can discipline themselves to "punch the clock" even when it is in their own house or apartment.

A bit later in this report we will consider some techniques to use in overcoming some of the work at home problems, but first we will consider the legit jobs versus the scams and also review the many different types of work available.

Legitimacy and Fraud

We have all heard the many different horror stories about identity theft and online frauds, and those looking for legit online jobs are going to have to really train themselves to identify the warning signs of a job that is too good to be true.

It is up to you to scrutinize the sites you use to search for work, and because there are so many options, it is good to know the few key phrases that can easily let you know when to avoid a listing through a job search engine or even at a freelancing website. Remember, most of the scams are run in order to quickly obtain a handful of names and credit card or bank account numbers, and then they are deleted. They remain entirely untraceable and tend to make life difficult for those who "fall" for their ploys. If you know how to read listings for the proverbial red flags and warning signs, however, you can usually spare yourself a lot of headaches.

For example, a listing that uses any of the following phrases should be avoided:

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- Package-forwarding - this is a scam that identity thieves use to get you to send them packages they order with stolen credit cards. These groups are very organized and can look very authentic, but all they are doing is setting you up as an accessory to theft and fraud. Never, under any circumstances, accept an offer to work as a package-forwarding employee;
- Money transfers and/ or wiring funds - we've all been the recipients of at least one email from someone such as a Nigerian millionaire asking us to help him or her with some money transfers. While such scams are a one-time deal, there are clever hucksters who create the same sort of scenario and post it as an ongoing job description. Any online job that asks you to handle money is more than likely a very bad scam;
- Training materials fee - this is a very easy way for a fake business to get your money by simply asking you to send a small amount of cash, or to hand over a credit card number, in order to obtain their proprietary training materials. Never pay a company any sort of advance fee in order to learn how to do the work they want. If they are legit, they will always train their staff at no cost;
- Entry posting fee - this is something most often appearing in data entry scams. It tells the potential employee that they will have to pay a small fee in order to access any of the listings that they will handle. This, again, is a scam because it is taking money from the employee in order to allow them to work. A real data entry position will simply link an employee's home computer to their network and then assign them tasks at no cost;
- One dollar fee scams - these are usually touted as a "success kit" and promise the individual that they are going to get all of the information they need to start working online for one of the major search engines or other global companies. The individual pays the "one dollar" and waits for the download, which never arrives. When they get their credit card

statement they often see that the fee was much more than a single dollar, and that they may even be enrolled in some sort of monthly payment plan that was hidden in the "terms and services" agreement;

- Ebay and/or PayPal - neither of these sites should be mentioned within the description of a work at home scenario. If you see that someone is promising ongoing work doing things like updating Ebay listings or doing something with PayPal accounts it is best to avoid them altogether - even if it sounds legit;
- Certification fee - this might sound very official and mention that you will have to take some sort of examination in order to ensure that you are able to work online for a specific company. Rest assured, there will be some hefty fees associated with your certification, and then there will be no job. This is one of the most common scams attached to online work;
- Foreign agent agreement - this is a dead giveaway that the job is a scam. This is because it is indicating that the individual is going to be doing tasks that will occur outside of their native borders, and this usually means that wire transfers, package-forwarding, or some other illegal work is going to be requested; and
- Grammatical and spelling errors - a professional business will never post a listing with a few errors or misspellings, it just doesn't happen. If you are reading a so-called job description that contains three or four very obvious mistakes in grammar or spelling it is usually a cue that the posting is a bunch of lies or a serious scam.

Although these phrases seem to have very little in common, they must be recognized as being totally inappropriate in a valid "job description". No employer will need to mention something like PayPal, fees, or financial transfers when discussing actual employment options. Once you have memorized the terms it will really help you to streamline your online job searches.

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Of course, it helps to know that there are a lot of valid opportunities, and the search for a work at home position can be greatly enhanced by simply understanding the exact type of online job you are seeking.

Understanding the Varieties of Online Jobs

Most modern professionals would all agree that there are three basic types of legit online jobs. These are:

- Working online or work at home - these are the jobs that are the focus of this report. They allow someone to serve as an employee of an actual company or to simply operate on a freelance basis. This is the sort of work that can take a huge array of formats and styles and can range from freelance writing to all kinds of data entry or bookkeeping. Usually, the individual will have a contract or negotiated amount of work with the employer, and will be paid on a weekly basis as if they were in a regular nine-to-five setting.

In some of these situations, the individual is operating as an independent contractor, and this means that any and all tax issues must be taken care of on their own. On the other hand, there are also some situations in which the employer actually manages payroll matters and tax issues too.

What is the most common approach? Most modern employers prefer to handle work at home staff as independent contractors or consultants who deal with payroll responsibilities on their own. As long as the individual has established themselves in the proper business entity and filed all of the necessary documentation, this is a very easy way to manage a "small business" and work from home.

- Online businesses - this allows an individual or a group to operate a store or other business entirely through the Internet. When it is structured as an online job, it is usually some sort of direct sales activity. For example,

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the predominate style of online business (in which the individual works from home or through the Internet) is the product promotion option. This is quite similar to the pyramid marketing type of work.

This sort of business asks the employee to purchase some sort of startup kit or franchising rights, and then to begin selling and marketing the item(s) independently. Along the way they are encouraged to continually recruit others to sell the same materials, and this makes it clear that the real income is from recruiting and not from actual sales of the program, item, or products. A lot of these opportunities are actually major scams, but there are some success stories with this type of online work.

- Providing online services - this is something that is less a work at home "job" and more of an actual business. For example, many entrepreneurs start online businesses in which they rent space on massive servers and then resell or rent segments of the servers to those who want to operate their own websites through them.

Generally, the owner or operator of an online service business is going to provide some sort of service in exchange for a direct payment. This means that the individual doing the work is going to have setup an official business website and own the means of providing the services. This is quite complex and detailed, but is a wonderful way for someone with advanced skills or knowledge to use them as a means of making a living while working from their home or on a contractual.

Now that we understand the different types of scenarios available, we can see that the optimal choice for those who are looking to "do the work and get the paycheck" is the "working online or work from home" situation.

This is the sort of job or career that requires very little startup funding, almost no business management, and can often be accomplished by simply getting a

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high-speed Internet connection, a reliable computer, a phone line, and a few pieces of office equipment.

Naturally, most of these jobs are going to require the individual to determine what their tax liabilities will be and how to manage them, and this means that they may have to actually create a business entity for themselves. This is very simple and requires only some basic documentation to complete. The smartest approach to this is to check with local tax offices to see how to go about structuring an independent business or sole proprietorship.

Now that we understand the ways in which online work can be viewed, we can begin looking at some of the truly legit online work opportunities. Even though we are listing some very specific types of work in this section, however, it is vitally important that the individual always remain keenly aware of the need to look for "red flag" terminology in every single listing or posting to which they apply. Scammers are getting very sophisticated in their tactics, and this means that even a well-written description on a reliable site could still be fraudulent. Use your knowledge of legit work to determine if something sounds a bit too good to be true.

Online Jobs

Before heading into the listings, we'll take just a few moments to consider precisely where you should be looking for the work. The vast majority of successful online employees use a few different approaches. These include:

- Freelance websites - there are a handful of massive websites designed to give people direct access to businesses and entrepreneurs in need of assistance or work. Consider that one of the most popular of these sites has job openings listed under categories that include "Web & Programming", "Design & Multimedia", "Writing & Translation", "Admin Support", "Sales & Marketing", "Finance & Management", "Legal", and much more. Clearly, this indicates that freelancing websites can give

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almost anyone a shot at finding consistent and reliable income entirely through independent work.

The way that most of the freelancing websites work is very simple - the job listing is posted by the individual or business seeking some assistance or staff. The freelancers review the description, and then create a proposal or bid for the work as described. Those looking to hire someone for the job can then review all of these proposals and accept the one that seems most suited to meet their needs.

This means that anyone hoping to work in this capacity is going to have to learn how to create the best proposals possible, and often this means have some valid credentials and even some modern advantages.

For example, when submitting a proposal, the bidder may want to have already created some sort of portfolio posted through the freelance site, or they may even want to make a website for themselves that itemizes the type of work or jobs they can (or perhaps already have) handled. This is self-marketing to a very high degree, but if it can get you a constant supply of online work it will be well worth the effort.

It is important to note that many of the better freelancing websites ask their customers to use a credit system or to pay for membership in order to access all of the listings. This is not the same as the monies demanded by scammers, and is a perfectly valid way for the sites to conduct business.

A freelancer can usually consider such memberships or fees as a tax-deductible expense, and it is important to always keep track of the costs associated with finding work in this way.

- Job search engines - there are a handful of sites that allow browsers to use specific search terms to find the type of work they desire. Usually

these sites have a "work from home" category, but most savvy searchers know to use an "advanced" search option to seek more specific phrasing.

What does that mean? Instead of heading directly to the section of the site where all of the "work from home" listings are posted, these folks might create an enhanced search that scouts out phrases like "telecommute" or "work online" instead. Often, it is only through searching all of the listings that they can identify opportunities to work from home for a valid business.

Once they find the listings that seem relevant, they may have to submit an online application or even a resume in order to get themselves "in the running" for the work. Here too, the skills used in creating a successful proposal for a freelance site will come in very handy. If you can direct a potential online employer to your well-designed website or to some sort of online portfolio of work, you are demonstrating a level of professionalism that may easily override the competition you are facing for the job.

- Regular search engines - many people also use traditional search engines to identify specific websites that make work at home or online jobs available too. This is not as direct an approach as the job search engines, but it can often turn up sites or pointers that can help someone identify some potential work as well. For example, there are a host of sites designed specifically for "stay at home Moms" who want a few hours of work to do each day. These sites might direct women to appropriate listings or they might just offer them an option to exchange ideas and experiences through some sort of "forum". This illustrates the value of doing a basic search because it can often turn up resources and tools that can lead someone to ongoing work.

- Directly through businesses - many major corporations and businesses are known for relying on a fleet of "at home" employees. It can really pay off to do the research and determine which of these businesses may have work that is suited to your particular skills.

For example, a transcriptionist can do a search of all of the global organizations in need of such services from online employees, and then make targeted approaches or searches within those companies' website job listings. They may even craft a sales "pitch" offering their services to the appropriate managers.

Once again, the need for a professional "package" will be essential to obtaining the work, and having a resume, portfolio, and even a URL to your business website can usually make the difference between getting the job and getting a polite, but negative, response.

Now is the moment to make a comment about competition. You will find that even dedicated hours spent crafting the perfect resume, writing a flawless cover letter, and building a top-notch website may not be enough to get the jobs you want. This has very little to do with your abilities and a great deal more to do with global competition.

Remember, the online job market is open to everyone in the entire world, and this means that some of your competition can ask for a lot less money for the same amount of work. It might also mean that a job which used to attract a few dozen bids is now receiving hundreds instead. This doesn't mean that you should avoid such listings; it simply indicates that you will have to position yourself in a stronger way.

You can often convince an employer to consider the quality over the price simply by packaging your skills in a very appealing way. This includes the portfolio and website, but also means asking every business that you work with for a reference or positive feedback at a freelancing or job search website.

Often this will earn you some sort of "star" or special recognition, and this only enhances your reputation with all online employers.

It does take time to get to this point, but once you have won a few contracts and received some feedback, it usually means that more and more of the work is going to flow your way.

Now that we understand the general format of the best online jobs, where to find them, and how to create a good impression, we can begin considering the most sought after skills.

The Top 6 Skills

- Call center and/or customer service jobs - there are thousands of businesses around the world that need their telephones managed during the afterhours. There are also all kinds of companies that extend 24-hour customer service options to their clients too. There are even major businesses that conduct business-to-business telemarketing (also known as lead-generation) on a regular basis in order to remain solvent. All of these groups need people to handle the phone or email lines.

This is where a work at home employee is an ideal solution because it allows the business to establish a large network into which each of the online employees will simply "login" to start their day. Regardless of whether the work involves handling client interaction, conducting sales calls, or simply taking and forwarding messages, it can all be done from home.

The only requirement for most of these jobs is that the employee has a reliable high-speed internet connection, an active telephone line, and sometimes a fax machine. Some arrangements ask the individual to work on a set schedule and others have employees login to the network on an "as needed" basis. The payment arrangements for these jobs will vary

quite widely as well, but the vast majority ensures a weekly or bi-weekly paycheck is received.

These are jobs that are readily found through freelancing and job search websites, and a direct search with some sort of call center website will often yield good results too.

Be aware that some businesses do require their potential employees to pay for a credit and/or background check. This is to ensure that the individual applying for the work has no criminal background or pending financial issues that would make it difficult for them to sustain the telecommunications needed for the work.

- Data entry - here is the skill area that is also the sort of work most open to scams. This is due to the fact that data entry can mean so many different things, and it is the variety of definitions that allows a scammer to create a job listing that has all of the sounds of a valid offering.

For example, a common scam is for a data entry position to be listed and described as "updating addresses". The applicant is directed to send money for a startup kit and their initial listings. What they get is something akin to a chain letter or even a direct sales opportunity, and nothing close to a consistent amount of well-paying work.

The best way to identify data entry work is usually through the freelancing websites because the businesses or employers have to be very clear about the terms of the project or the work. These sites never allow a business to ask for money from potential employees as well, and this usually means that the opportunities are valid and safe.

The range of work to be done under the "data entry" heading is quite significant and this usually means that the potential employee should have solid skills in all of the spreadsheet, database, and word processing programs so often associated with such tasks.

Usually, the employer is going to send sets of data to the work at home employee, or is going to have the individual log into a company computer or network to tackle the work. The paychecks may be based on the amount of data managed, on an hourly rate agreed upon in advance of the beginning of the project, or an amount contracted per the specific job.

- Bookkeeping - a lot of enormous businesses are happy to employ a huge number of "telecommuting" bookkeepers and accountants. The thing to remember about any of these jobs is that they usually demand that the individual is certified to do the work.

This is for several reasons - first they are going to be handling such significant issues as payroll, accounts receivable, and even taxation issues, and secondly they are going to be working independently. Because a work at home bookkeeper is working alone, they cannot have any sort of questions about procedures or processes.

This means that a CPA with previous experience in bookkeeping or public accounting is far more likely to get some of the work than a "startup" bookkeeper with no training and no experience.

The office requirements for this type of online job tend to include a high-speed Internet connection, a reliable phone line, and a fax machine. These are usually the most basic "essentials" because so much of the work is done using such things as spreadsheets and even faxed documents. This means that a home office setup is normally part of the process of establishing yourself as a work at home bookkeeper.

Usually, the employer is going to send the work directly to the employee, or will ask them to log into a company computer or network instead. The paychecks will be based on an hourly rate agreed upon in advance of the beginning of the project, or an amount contracted per the specific job.

There are many ways that these online jobs can be found, and because of this it is essential to use all of the search techniques listed, especially the freelancing sites and the direct approach to a major business. Just be sure that you have "packaged" your skills and experience in a way that specifically meets the needs of the job description and you are likely to win a few of the projects.

- Transcription services - this too is a job area of significant diversity. For example, you could be doing corporate, medical or legal transcription. You might also be transcribing interviews or recordings. There are even some companies looking for people to transcribe the dialogue in video recordings of all kinds too. Some businesses also want someone to take dictation and draft formal correspondence as well.

Clearly, this means that someone with formal transcription training is going to be able to find a huge array of work. Selecting a focal area, such as medical transcription, might be a more productive choice, but simply establishing yourself as an experienced transcriptionist may mean taking a wide array of work before you can focus a bit more intensely on a single area.

The office requirements for this job will always include a good computer, a high-speed Internet connection, a fax machine, a reliable telephone connection, and the ability to receive overnight and express deliveries. There will also be the need to be able to send out express packages too, since returning completed manuscripts or files quickly is often part of the process of doing transcriptions.

Usually, the employer is going to send work to the employee via the Internet or courier. Sometimes there are arrangements that allow the individual log into a company computer to tackle the work too. The paychecks may be based on the amount of transcription done, on an

hourly rate agreed upon in advance, or an amount contracted per the specific job.

Finding these jobs will require you to look in all of the areas already indicated. This is because such a diversity of work exists, and the projects can range from individual jobs to ongoing work. Additionally, a lot of businesses wrongly post transcription services under such headings as data entry or writing jobs, so it really pays to do targeted searches using terms such as "transcribe" and "transcription" too.

- Virtual assistant jobs - this is one of the newest of all the legit online jobs and it is one of the coolest because it allows someone with an array of skills to obtain a truly unique form of employment.

We already mentioned that many people who work from home develop a sense of isolation. Those who serve as virtual assistants (or VAs), however, are constantly interacting directly with the people for whom they work and rarely ever get the sense that they are "alone" throughout the entire working day.

VAs are basically personal or office assistants who don't have to actually appear in the office to do their jobs. The work they do can range from many types of business correspondence and communications to such things as updating of blogs, making calls, and even handling reservations and travel arrangements. Basically, whatever a standard office assistant does, the VA might end up doing too! Some of these jobs also incorporate tasks like bookkeeping, errands and event planning as well.

This means that the resume, portfolio, and website are going to have to clearly itemize the range of skills that the individual can offer and also give some evidence to back up the claims. This is a time when references and positive feedback are absolutely essential to getting the job.

It also usually requires that a home office with all of the most reliable and modern equipment is available. A fast computer, high-speed Internet, a land-based telephone line, a mobile phone, a fax machine, and much more may be essential for the work.

Usually, the employer is going to make all kinds of arrangements with the employee about how the work will be done, received, or scheduled. The paychecks are normally received on a weekly basis, and most employers utilize some sort of electronic funds transfer which requires the VA to handle the taxes and payroll issues on their own.

These jobs will be found in all of the ways mentioned earlier in this report and are normally among the most competitive listings to be found.

- Blogging / freelance writing / ghostwriting - this is a fascinating way for someone to earn an income without leaving home. Basically, these are jobs that can be found with actual agencies that tackle all kinds of online and Internet writing requirements and which employ a large number of writers who submit their work via the Internet, or they are jobs done by individuals who win contracts or projects too. This work is highly competitive and it is normally those who have strong portfolios and websites who tend to receive the largest share of the work.

The office essentials for this sort of online job include a fast computer and high-speed Internet connection, and usually a reliable telephone line is necessary too.

These online jobs can be found most often through freelancing sites, which means that the individual is going to have to really sharpen their proposal writing skills. Many writers and bloggers find that specialization can really help them gain an advantage over the competition, and so they might focus on blogs, eBooks, or SEO content instead of spreading themselves across a wider range of work.

The ways in which this work is received and completed range widely too. Some writers work directly with a client and others with a sort of "middle man" who distributes the jobs. The payment systems vary accordingly as well and some writers will receive "per article" payments while others can count on a weekly paycheck too.
